

EDITH MENNA — 1940-2020

It is with profound sadness that we announce the passing of **Edith Webb Menna** on August 19, 2020. Born on September 16, 1940 in Murray, Utah to parents Wilford and Eva Webb, Edith was the fifth of six children. After a fortuitous meeting and falling in love at first sight, Edith married her

beloved companion of 59 years, Tony Menna on May 5, 1959 and their marriage was later solemnized in the Salt Lake Temple on May 9, 1967. Edith was a dedicated wife, mother and grandmother, treasuring time spent with her husband, children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren above all else. She loved to camp, play games, and have long conversations with those she loved most.

Passionate about her heritage and adeptly skilled in leadership, Edith served as Museum Director of the Pioneer Memorial Museum and on the

International Daughters of Utah Pioneers Board for 23 years. She also served on the Governor's board of Museums for eight years. In 1996, Edith received the prestigious "Pioneer of Progress" award from LDS President Gordon B. Hinckley for her indelible contributions to helping carry on pioneer traditions. Major projects she was responsible for included the restoration of the 1902 Steam Fire Engine Roosevelt, as well as directing a project to collect and publish a large volume of pioneer stories.

20 YEAR VOLUNTEER IN HISTORY DEPARTMENT

MULBERRY CAMP FIELD TRIP

Members of the **Mulberry Camp**, Washington East Company, Washington, Utah, took a field trip to one of the four aviation navigation arrows still existing in Washington County,

Utah, to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the first coast-to-coast airmail delivery route in the United States. Pilots had to depend on landmarks to make their way across the country, and this was almost impossible in dark and inclement weather. The problem was solved by using 70-foot concrete arrows, placed every 10 miles; the arrows were painted yellow and lit by a 50-foot steel tower that held a rotating beacon.

PRESERVING A LEGACY

Organized in 1936, the **Clark County Company** worked diligently to preserve the Old Las Vegas Mormon Fort, an LDS mission halfway between Utah and California. **LaRue Rosenberg** took an active interest in this cause beginning with her membership in 1994. Daughters were a driving force behind saving the original Fort and assisting with it becoming a State Park. As a DUP/Fort liaison, LaRue's dedication in support of activities and fundraisers was invaluable. When the original Clark County Company expanded in June 2007, LaRue was instrumental in organizing the Clark Nevada Legacy Meadows Company, serving as President from 2008 to 2013 and Company Chaplain from 2013 to 2020. LaRue was born August 18, 1943, and passed away August 22, 2020.

In May 2015, Carolyn Goodman, Las Vegas Mayor, presented Legacy Meadows and Desert Springs Companies with a Proclamation Award for the work DUP performs at the Fort. They also received a Historic Preservation Certificate recognizing volunteer hours spent creating and implementing history outreach and educational programs for Las Vegas elementary students, of which LaRue was an active participant. She was an advocate for outreach, family history and pioneer heritage.

The walls were made strong by stacking 2x6 lengths of lumber, each layer nailed to the one below. With an added layer of wood siding and hundreds of nails, this would have made the walls nearly bulletproof.

153 YEAR-OLD QUILT TOP DONATED TO DAVIS LAYON COMPANY

In July 2020, **Lucia Pabst**, Syracuse, Utah, contacted her friend, Nadine Boudrero, who is Captain of the **Westward Ho Camp**, Davis Layton Company in Layton, Utah. She asked if the camp or company would be interested in a 153 year-old guilt top that had been



passed down from generation to generation in her family. Lucia was in very poor health and her family was not interested in keeping the guilt as an heirloom, so she donated it to the Davis Layton Company. The guilt top was made by Farina (Feena) Maria Bentley Lucas for her sister Sylvia Louise Bentley's wedding in 1867. The quilt was never finished. After seeing that it was in excellent condition, it was decided that the company

should finish this quilt. We would like to thank Marlene Phister for her expertise in sewing and Cody Mazura for her knowledge of antique quilting and donating to the company the cotton batting, muslin for the backing, and the waxed threading that would have been used 150 years ago. One week before the quilt was finished, Lucia died on September 13, 2020. It was her desire that the quilt would be displayed in the pioneer cabin next to the Layton Heritage Museum in Layton, Utah. Lucia's wish will come true.

UNION FORT PIONEER MEMORIAL CEMETERY

The Union Fort Pioneer Memorial Cemetery had its beginning in 1851, when the wife of Rufus Forbush passed away and was buried in the southern portion of his property. The next spring, Forbush found several new graves by his wife's, so he turned his property into a cemetery — The Union Fort Pioneer Memorial Cemetery.

Among many prominent pioneers, former slaves Green Flake and Hark Lay Wales are buried here. They both arrived in Brigham Young's Vanguard Company in 1847. Green Flake was present for the 1897 Pioneer Jubilee. Flake passed away four years later.

SARA MAR CAMP MARKERS TOUR

Members of the **Sara Mar Camp**, Franklin Company, Franklin, Idaho, made a goal to visit all 12 markers in their company area. They traveled from one end of the county to the other and cleaned the markers as they went. They enjoyed beautiful weather and learned the histories given on the individual monuments. They broadened their knowledge by including a new monument site that complimented the DUP markers. They also visited the historical landmark Red Rock Pass, where one of the group members' family still owns property. She shared her personal stories and history of the place she grew up in. Sara Mar completed the goal by organizing the field trips using opening and closing socials. Some members did outreach by taking their families to visit these markers during the summer.

SILVER FORK MARKER

Rebecca Grant Schultz, Captain of Sweetwater Camp, Salt Lake Far South East Company, Salt Lake City, Utah, found that Marker #365, "Silver Fork Monument" near Brighton Ski Resort had been entrusted to their camp. She and her husband visited the monument and found that it needed much restoration. With many hours of work and labor, the couple completed their difficult task. The monument is now in great condition and visitors can view the plaque that reads: "Big Cottonwood Lumber Co., organized in 1854 by Brigham Young, Daniel H. Wells and others, erected two water powered sawmills in Silver Fork. Log homes, stores and post office were built to accommodate families. Silver Springs Branch of the LDS Cottonwood Ward organized in May 1858, George B. Gardiner, President. Approximately 21 silver mines were located, among them the Prince of Wales and Antelope groups developed by Walker Brothers, production beginning in 1870. A small smelter was built in 1871 by Wightman and Co."

DUP PRESIDENT GOES "MARKER HUNTING" WITH THREE GRANDSONS

On a sunny morning in August, President Ellen Jeppson, loaded three grandsons in the car and went marker hunting. Armed with the ISDUP Marker Directory, they traveled to Salt Lake City and found Marker #262, "Lone Cedar Tree" in the middle of the street on 600 East and 300 South. The marker read: "Although willows grew along the banks of the streams a Lone Cedar Tree near this spot became Utah's first famous landmark. Someone in a moment of thoughtlessness cut it down, leaving only the stump which is a part of this monument. In the glory of my prime I was the pioneer's friend."

Moving on, they visited Marker #509, "First Encampment in the Salt Lake Valley." Walking through the tiny park around the monument, they talked about what the first camp might have looked like.

They spent the rest of the day visiting markers in Salt Lake and Davis County, going out to lunch and talking about the pioneers. On the way home, she was asked: "How many of these markers are there?" Ellen said that she thought there were about 587. They boys were quiet for a minute and then one said, "We've got a lot of hunting to do."

How about a trip with your children or grandchildren? It would be a perfect way to escape virus restrictions.

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
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WHITE MEETING HOUSE MARKER DEDICATION

A very special event was held in Springville, Utah, in September. **Marker #587**, "White Meeting House," was dedicated before a large crowd of ISDUP Board members, DUP members from Utah Springville/Mapleton Company, and guests.

One cannot mention the "Old Meeting House" without remembering the first school in Springville. This building was originally built as the "big school house" by John Alex and William Nichols in 1855.

In about 1859, the LDS Church purchased the building in which school was still being taught. It also was used for dances and other gatherings. It stood on this site from 1856 to 1927. The White Meeting House was a cherished landmark used primarily for religious services. On September 18, 1937, a marker was installed which read "Site of the first LDS Meeting house, A.D. 1856. This marker erected by Sons and Daughters of Springville Pioneers." The marker was removed

in 2010 when the Springville Public Library was built. The original marker was misplaced for a long period of time until it was discovered in a city storage facility.

This event was sponsored by the Springville/Mapleton Company, Springville Historical Society, Springville Pioneer Museum and Daughters of Utah Pioneers Oak Hills Camp. The project committee included Ellen C. Clyde, Linda Whitney Brown and M. Lee Taylor.

The beautifully planned program included remarks by Mayor Richard J. Child, introductions by ISDUP Marker Chairperson Mary Shumway, and remarks by ISDUP President Ellen Jeppson. Historical remarks were presented by Daryl Tucker, President of Springville Historical Society.



Pioneer Mysteries
