GRANT RECIPIENTS

Congratulations to the satellite museums who received grants! Laurel Cannon Alder, Grants Manager for the Utah Division of Arts and Museums (UMA), announced the following DUP museums received state monies in the Tier II category: Morgan County DUP, Morgan, Utah; Cache County DUP in Logan, Utah; American Fork DUP, American Fork, Utah; and Miss Mary Salina Historical Museum, Salina, Utah. These grants were for \$1,000 each for specific projects.

Other funding received by the satellite museums were: **American Fork DUP Museum**, American Fork, Utah – \$7,500 from the city in Parks, Arts, Recreation and Culture (PARC) funds.

Cache County DUP Logan, Utah – \$4,200 from UMA in Preservation funds; \$7,000 from the county in Recreation, Arts, Parks & Zoo (RAPZ) funds.

Weber Northeast Company in Marriot-Slaterville, Utah – \$30,000 in Recreation, Arts, Museums, and Parks (RAMP) grant from the county.

Cache County DUP Museum in Logan, Utah will begin to receive annual payments from the bequest of Donna Gossner, who set up \$20,000 in a trust for the museum.

UINTA WYOMING COMPANY CONVENTION

Inspired from the November 2015 lesson, this year's theme for our convention was "Coverlets, Counterpanes, and Comforters - Old and New." Denice Wheeler, Company President, welcomed 54 daughters from the seven camps in Uinta County who brought over 50 quilts for display. Some artifacts displayed from Joyce Martinez's collection used for the preparation of varn and weaving materials included a spinning wheel, loom, weaving machine, weasel, and wool carders. Pioneer quilts 100 years old and modern covers represented the changes in bedding throughout time.

The Uinta Wyoming Company gave special recognition to **Camp Wyuta** on celebrating their 80th anniversary this year. Organized on June 20, 1936, Camp Wyuta is the only one of the early camps still active and functioning. The camp chose the name Wyuta from a railroad siding on the Utah Wyoming

Railroad Line. The Union Pacific still uses the site today.

Kay Ann Saxton, ISDUP Satellite Museum Director and camp sponsor, presented Camp Wyuta with a camp charter containing the names of the charter members and the signatures of the Central Company President, Cornelia Lund and the Uinta Company President, Mrytle Ann Tuttle Stevens. Charter information came from the DUP minutes taken 80 years ago!

LOVELESS ADOBE HOME DEDICATION

Vera Ivy's great-grandfather James Washington Loveless and his wife, Matilda E. McClellen, left Nauvoo and the home of the Saints on April 27, 1846. They went through Council

Bluff, the Elkhorn, and finally arrived in Salt Lake City September 15, 1851. They built an adobe home adequate for George and Matilda and their 12 children. At the time, 80 percent of Provo homes were adobe. The Loveless home is one of the few remaining adobe homes in Provo, and it is an exceptional example of that style of construction. The George A. Smith Pioneer Village, maintained by the Sons of Utah Pioneers, helped move and restore the home. The dedication of the first adobe home built in Provo took place on March 25, 2015. Vera is a member of Camp Sunrise, in the Weber Far South Company.



HIGHLAND DUP CAMP CABIN RIBBON CUTTING

On Saturday, June 6, 2015, the **Highland DUP Camp** of the Utah North Company, Utah, celebrated the repairs that had been made on their 130-year-old pioneer cabin with a ribbon cutting ceremony. This cabin, donated to the Highland DUP Camp by Louise Stice in 1991, is the last vestige of pioneer life in Highland. The outside of the cabin had fallen into disrepair. In 2014, five scouts completed their Eagle projects by repairing the outside of the cabin, replacing the doors, installing a new roof, and sanding and painting the fence. Volunteers donated over 770 hours of labor. With the cost of the labor figured in and all the money and materials donated, the cost of the repairs was about \$12,000. This project was supported in part by the Utah Division of Arts and Museums (UMA), with funding from the State of Utah and the National Endowment for the Arts in the form of a \$1,000 grant. The mayor of Highland, Mark Thompson, cut the ribbon.

COMPANY PRESENTS CABIN TO KAYSVILLE CITY

"A Cabin in the Park" was the theme of the Davis Kaysville Company Jubilee, Kaysville, Utah held on Saturday, May 21. Following a brunch at a nearby church, Daughters were joined by the descendants of George P. and Ann Eliza Adams for a presentation of the 1876 log cabin to Kaysville City.

Sharon Hadley, Company President, remarked that three years ago they wanted to find a log cabin to restore in remembrance of pioneer settlers. In March 2015, the Adams cabin became available.

The original cabin came from nearby Adams Canyon. Through the years, the home had several additions added to the original 16x18 foot structure. Restoration began by removing the additions and restoring the home to its original size. It was moved from Layton to the Kaysville Heritage Park, 150 N. Fairfield Rd, Kaysville, Utah. Chase, 16 years old and Bridger, 14 years old; two of the 4th great grandsons of George P and Ann Eliza Adams built benches at the cabin for visitors to sit on for their Eagle projects. They selected slate seats so visitors could experience something of early days in Utah.

For the program, Kathryn McCormick, a descendant of the Adams, gave a brief history of the mother, Ann Eliza Adams. Ann Eliza and George P. Adams had 10 children, some born after the various additions to the cabin. After the presentation of the cabin to Kaysville City, Mayor Steve Hiatt accepted this

incredible gift.

MARKER #580 AND CAMP PROJECT

Isaac Burton and Turner Bushell, two Eagle Scout candidates, coordinated the efforts of BSA Mt. View 1st Ward scouts and families for the presentation of the American flag. On display were histories and photos of the Wight Fort pioneers as well as the two-year fundraising timeline. Captain Crane gave thanks to the City of West Jordan Parks Department, Sons of Utah Pioneers, local businesses and donors,

and the husbands of the Wight Fork Camp's Daughters. The cemetery was dedicated by Elder Allen F. Packer. Descendants of pioneers interred there made this a very tender day.

all who helped! The sons of Colleen Barlow, a charter member, were the muscle and brains making our vision possible. The cemetery is located at 3491 West 9000 South, West Jordan, Utah.

MARKER # 535 BIG HORN, WYOMING **BIG HORN LDS STAKE OFFICE AND** TITHING BUILDING

In 1900, Lorenzo Snow, President of the LDS Church, sent settlers to northern Wyoming where they established the towns of Byron and Cowley, and built a water canal from the Shoshone River to land surrounding the towns. In 1909 the LDS Church then build an administration and tithing office in Cowley.

After the LDS stake office moved to Lovell, other organizations used the building. But, by 1990 the building had fallen into disrepair. The native sandstone building with its single piece double columns had been a tribute to the ingenuity and strength of those 1900 pioneers.

In 1997, through the concerted efforts of local citizens, the LDS Church sold the building and property to the town of Cowley. The building was extensively renovated to become the Town of Cowley Administration Building and pioneer museum. On July 24, 2004, The Daughters of Utah Pioneers Sagebrush Camp placed Marker #535 on the front of the building.

Our pioneer activities include chores like washing clothes in a tub and carrying water using buckets and yokes and pioneer games like rolling the hoop, spinning tops, buzz saws, marbles, and jacks. We invited the Old Time Fiddlers for music. We have been thrilled that the community has embraced the activities and that the museum has had a positive impact on the community.
