Dear Daughters,

Happy Demisemiseptcentennial to you all! Translation — Happy 175th Anniversary of the July 24, 1847, arrival of the Vanguard Company of Pioneers into the Salt Lake Valley. This year also marks the 175th anniversary of the arrival of the

Mormon Battalion in California in January of 1847. These two events are triumphant examples of the faith and strength of the early pioneers. We honor them and are proud to be their descendants. Please enjoy the celebrations this year for these special anniversaries.

On Monday, April 5, 1847, the first group of pioneers left Winter Quarters on their trek to the Rocky Mountains. The 148 members of the company included three women and two children as discussed in the March

2022 lesson. The women were: Ellen Sanders Kimball, wife of Heber Chase Kimball; Clarissa (Clara) Decker Young, wife of Brigham Young; and Harriet Page Wheeler Decker Young, wife of Lorenzo Dow Young. I believe it took great courage for these women to leave their families willingly to find a new home somewhere in the West.

Clara Young was only eighteen years old when she walked across the plains. One of the first cabins in the new fort was built for her. Her new home was eighteen feet square with a dirt floor and a roof made of willows and dirt. She had a fireplace, bed, and chest which doubled as a table. Brigham Young left to return to Winter Quarters on August 24, leaving Clara to await his return the following year.

Harriet Young was pregnant when she left Winter Quarters. She also brought her son, Isaac, and her husband's son, Lorenzo, along with her chickens and a cow. Arriving in the

Valley, Harriet said, "I would rather go another thousand miles than stay in this desolate valley." But stay she did. Harriet's baby was born two months later on September 20.

Ellen Kimball, known for her kindness and ministering efforts for all members of the company, was only twenty-four years old when she came to the Salt Lake Valley. Practically barefoot, she received the first pair of shoes made in the Valley, constructed from the tops of an old pair of boots. The shoemaker also presented her with a tiny pair of moccasins made from the scraps of the boots for the baby she was expecting. Her husband returned to Winter Quarters in August, and Ellen was left in the care of her friends. Her baby, Samuel Chase Kimball, was born on February 13, 1848. Samuel died in July of 1848, before his father returned.

I find great inspiration in reading about these stalwart women who were courageous as they stayed behind in the Salt Lake Valley when their loved ones left to assist others coming West, with a promise to return. As we work to preserve the histories of these and all pioneers, we can feel their strength, and they can become examples for us.

We know much of what our pioneer ancestors sacrificed for us. We show our appreciation, admiration, and love to them by emulating their lives and remembering their stories.

There are 592 DUP Markers around the world. Local Camps and Companies own these markers and are responsible for their care.

#### **CAMP FORMATION**

Camps may be formed with ten members as a charter foundation. Camps do not have to disband when membership numbers drop below ten. Members of the camp should concentrate on recruiting new members and revitalizing inactive members.

#### **HEADSTONE MEDALLIONS**

Headstone Medallions are available for purchase at the Museum for deceased Daughters. When ordering, please have the membership number of the daughter for whom it is being purchased. These medallions are a wonderful memorial to your ancestor.

#### CITY JOURNAL NEWSPAPER HONORS 175 YEARS OF ARRIVAL OF PIONEERS

A full-page article by Julie Nichols Thompson in the *Bountiful City Journal* newspaper paid honor to Daughters of Utah Pioneers with a picture and details of an interview with President, Ellen Jeppson.

The extensive article was both personal and informative about our organization. It emphasized we are non-profit and members of the board are all volunteers. It stated that we are a growing group with over 26,000 active members, 582 members at large and 495 associates in 15 states and two countries. More than 300 applications were processed in one quarter in 2021.

# GETTING TO KNOW YOUR MUSEUM

#### THE DUP MUSEUM RESOURCE FILE

The DUP Museum has ten filing cabinets in the Manuscript Room next to the Library with documents open to the public. These are amazing resources. Three filing cabinets are locality histories. Many of them are Utah counties and cities, but we also have Idaho, Nevada, Arizona, California, and other states. For example, the folder for Sevier County contains information about the town of Aurora and other towns in the county. Every Utah county has a file containing stories, histories, newspaper clippings, pictures, magazine articles, and programs for events. These files contain the locality histories submitted by Daughters.

The other seven filing cabinets are topics A-Z. These files contain information about subjects such as architects, buildings like the Salt Lake Theatre, Gilgal Sculpture Park, and ships the pioneers sailed on such as the *Amazon* and *Cynosure*. One can read about the sego lily, grist mills, pioneer recipes, pioneer medicine, and music. Photocopies of articles can be produced for purchase.

#### **DUP MUSEUM LIBRARY**

There are over 49,000 pioneer histories in our library. Thank you to everyone who has submitted these histories. There are also donated books with histories of pioneer families. There is a section for counties and cities in Utah, Idaho, Nevada, California, and others. We also have bound collections of magazines such as the *Utah Historical Quarterly*, *The Woman's Exponent*, and others. The books are catalogued and available for research in the Museum. We have new books donated almost monthly. Our most-used book is *Ships, Saints, and Mariners – A Maritime Encyclopedia of Mormon Migration, 1830-1890* by Conway B. Sonne, University of Utah Press, 1987. This book has information, stories, and pictures of all the ships used by the pioneers coming across the ocean.

#### URANIUM GLASS AT THE MUSEUM

Last fall, DUP member Mati Mayfield of American Fork discovered there were at least five pieces of uranium glass in the Museum. She shared her discovery with the librarian, Pam Carson. Some pioneers brought their beautiful uranium glass with them when they came to Utah. Uranium glass is any glass with uranium oxide in it for coloration. The glass is green to yellow-green depending on oxidation and concentration of uranium ions. The glass is harmless. To check if greenish glass is uranium glass, use an ultraviolet light flashlight. If it is uranium glass, it will glow a bright green to yellow-green. Check with a docent or the librarian if you would like to see the glass at the Museum with a flashlight.

## WRITING VERSUS COPYING PIONEERING HISTORIES

Our History Department has nearly 50,000 histories. Unfortunately, many folders contain multiple copies of the same history. Ancestry.com and Family Search are convenient avenues to search for information. Simply hitting the print key on your computer and attaching our title page is a copyright issue unless you **researched**, **documented** and **personally wrote** the history you are printing. If you have discovered new information about an ancestor that hasn't already been recorded and shared through multiple avenues and you are the **original author** please share it with ISDUP.

A GRAVES history should be brief. Two or three sentences about a person who died on the trail is usually all the information that is available. Please don't include two or three pages about the family as we usually already have a file for them.

Information from the website www.findagrave.com and death certificates are available online, therefore please don't include them in your histories.

There are still many histories that can be written. We have many folders that only have a faded obituary. Pioneers who are not well known also deserve a written history.

#### JEANNE TURNER SHARES ANCESTOR'S STORY

At a recent meeting of **Gunnison Camp**, Sanpete South Company, Utah, **Jeanne Turner** gave a short history of her relative, Mary Elizabeth Grover. Mary's father was Thomas Grover, an early leader in The Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints. He was born in 1807 and died in 1886.

Mary Elizabeth Grover described the events surrounding the murder of Joseph Smith, Jr., and Hyrum Smith. "The evening that the Prophet Joseph Smith, Jr., and Hyrum Smith were brought home from Carthage, after they were martyred, I will never forget. Everybody stood along the street holding their hands, and bowed their heads in solemn reverence as the bodies were escorted through the street. Everyone's heart was so filled with sorrow,

it seemed as if the world would come to an end. My father, Thomas Grover, helped wash and prepare them for burial. Their caskets were set on chairs side by side in the hall of Prophet's home. Hundreds viewed their remains. He saw them both. Hyrum had a bullet hole right beside his nose, but Joseph had no marks in sight."

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

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### **OLD LAS VEGAS MORMON FORT** STATE HISTORIC PARK

If you have the opportunity this summer, a visit to the **Old** Las Vegas Mormon Fort State Historic Park is a wonderful family adventure. The Fort has an important place in western history. Mormon missionary William Bringhurst arrived at the fort site January 14, 1855. Brigham Young thought the fort was very important to the Church because it was half way between Salt Lake City and Los Angeles. It is located at 500 East Washington Avenue and was the first to become a Nevada State Historical Park.

The fort was the first structure built by people of European heritage in Las Vegas and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Octavius Gass occupied it in 1865, but defaulted on a loan to Archibald Stewart who took it over in 1881 with his wife, Helen. In 1902, William Clark acquired the property from Helen Stewart. It was subsequently acquired by the Las Vegas Elks Club in 1955. The City of Las Vegas, with the support of ISDUP, acquired it in 1989. The Daughters have been sponsoring activities at the Fort every year since then. There are two ISDUP markers at the site.
