

- 9. I see us reaching out more diligently into the schools and community to instill in young and old the importance of cherishing heritage.
- 10. I see us growing not only in numbers, but in strength as we demonstrate the importance of the organization in our lives.

Mary Johnson went on to ask all current members to invite one new member to join the organization in the centennial year. What a powerful challenge and set of goals for all members of DUP! As an international organization, we can see growth in each of these areas, and encourage each member to continue their efforts to make Mary's dream a reality.

Thank you to all members of Daughters of Utah Pioneers who dedicate their time, leadership, and service to the society. We know much of what our Pioneer ancestors sacrificed for us. We show our appreciation, admiration, and love to them by emulating their lives and remembering their stories.

PIONEER HIGHLIGHT WYOMING LED IN WOMEN'S VOTING RIGHTS

In an alphabetical listing of the states, Wyoming is last; in women's right to vote, Wyoming is first. The Wyoming Organic Act, creating the territory of Wyoming, passed the House and the Senate and was signed into law on July 25, 1868, by President Andrew Johnson.

In her book, *Wyoming Frontier State*, Velma Linford recorded that in1869 President Ulysses S. Grant set about organizing the new territory and named John A. Campbell, the first Territorial Governor of Wyoming.

the first Territorial Governor of Wyoming. Under Governor Campbell, William H. Bright introduced Senate Bill 70, on November 27, 1869. On December 10, 1869, Wyoming became the first territorial government in the United States to have women's suffrage and keep it. Governor Campbell signed the bill at midnight on the last night of the session. Early in the morning of the General Election of September 6, 1870 Louisa Gardner Swain became the first woman to vote.

The Second Territorial Legislature succeeded in having Senate Bill 70 repealed, but Governor Campbell vetoed the repeal bill. A second attempt was made in September of 1889, not about women having the right to vote, but whether or not it would postpone statehood for Wyoming. An important section, with a suffrage clause of Wyoming's State Constitution, was submitted to Congress and passed. Wyoming became the 44th state July 10, 1890 and earned the title of "The Equality State."

Dick Blust, Jr., Director of the Sweetwater County Historical Museum, noted a number of firsts for Wyoming from 1869-1988:

Esther Hobart Morris, became first Justice of the Peace; six women served on a jury; Martha Symons Boies Atkinson, appointed court bailiff; Estelle Reel elected to statewide office; Jackson became first town in America governed solely by women: female mayor, town council, and town marshal; Nellie Tayloe Ross became Governor; Harriet Elizabeth "Liz" Byrd became first full-time, certified African American teacher. Later, she served in the Legislature, and then the State Senate.

FIRST SCHOOL IN JENSEN

Beginning in 1881, Lydia Chatwin, at the age of 13, taught local children in one room of a log house. Sixteen of her descendants attended the dedication along with state and county leaders Scott Chew, Uintah County, Utah State House Representative and Brad Horrocks, County Commissioner. Lucky Wall, great-great-grandson of Lydia, offered the dedicatory prayer. Members of the Escalante Camp brought this project to fruition.

GEORGE M. OTTINGER

When the Pioneer Memorial Museum was refurbished in 2009, a dark painting was found in the back of a closet. The back of the painting revealed that it was painted by George Martin Ottinger. Ottinger was the head of the Salt Lake Fire Department from 1876-1890. He was also noted as an esteemed artist of the 19th century, his works having a key influence on Utah artists. In the spring of this year, we had this painting cleaned and conserved. The beautiful landscape came to life in its splendor after a two-month restoration. This painting can be seen in the Artifacts Office of the Pioneer Memorial Museum. We plan to move it to a more appropriate spot as soon as possible.
