

Dear Daughters,

This has been a very busy season with the ninety district conventions. I hope you have all enjoyed your own conventions.

I recently attended a most unusual marker dedication in Stockton, California. In 1949, California was celebrating 100 years of statehood. They decided to place bronze markers

in various places to commemorate important events in California history. The Ship Brooklyn Saints played a big part in early California. These two plagues marked the events of the first wheat raised in the San Joaquin Valley and how the pioneers got to that area to plant the wheat. The Daughters of Utah Pioneers in Alameda County, under the direction of President Cleo Ricks, provided the bases for these two markers and they were dedicated on October 22, 1949, by Apostle Matthew Cowley. As freeways were built, each of the markers needed to be moved. Over the years life happens and

the plaques went missing. In 1989, DUP members in Stanislaus Company raised the money to replace one, *Comet Landing*.

In 2011 it was discovered that the *Comet Landing* plaque was again missing, but later located in a city office where it had been rescued and put it away. The *Comet Landing* marker was now placed by the San Joaquin River in what is the city of Lathrop. The *First Wheat* marker was placed along Highway 99 in the city of Ripon where the first wheat in the valley was grown. Our ladies of the San Joaquin Company have now rescued them and with some help from the Rotary Club, they are again sharing the history of California and those *Ship Brooklyn* pioneers. Our ladies presented a grand program to commemorate this event with displays and music from the community and church members involved.

Several conventions have used songs from the new *Pioneer Song Contest Music Book*. We will be using more of these songs in the years to come with our lessons. Aren't they fun to sing?

I have had a number of our members call and write to me asking, "How are we supposed to be involved with Family Search and the histories that we submit to DUP?"

I recently received a letter from one of our daughters quite concerned that she had seen a history she had written and given to DUP now submitted to Family Search by someone else who was taking credit for writing the history. This person had purchased a copy of this history from us and was now claiming she had written it. This is plagiarism and presents a very difficult problem in relation to Family Search.

I want to let all of you know what is being done at headquarters about the issue of working with Family Search. **Don't get in a hurry!** We are working with them to figure out the best way we can cooperate with the Church, to share what we have collected over 100 years so that family members around the world can have access to this information while still maintaining control through DUP. We will not simply turn over to the Church all of our files of histories. The revenue we receive from these files helps with our finances, so we cannot afford to give that away. We have promised you we would take good care of these histories. We are working on a system where the FS site can refer a person to our (DUP) website to purchase from us the desired history or photo. The details are still being worked out and the contract isn't complete yet. We will keep you, our members, informed about this venture.

Please keep up the wonderful work that you are doing in writing histories of these ancestors that we cherish. This is our main source of information for our great lessons.

Now it is getting close to International Seminar for the company leaders. This is a very important meeting for you to attend. We work hard preparing for you to have the best time and information to take to your camps and members to help you do your best.

Start planning for the future! I am excited about the International Convention in October. Yes, we do start preparing way ahead for these things. Our keynote speaker will be Glenn Rawson. Who is he, you say. If you remember the "Joseph Smith Papers" TV series and then the following series called "History of the Saints" you are familiar with Glenn Rawson. Mark this on your calendar, October 11, 2014.

The mission is to collect books dealing with personalities and families of the pioneer period, specifically, books of those who came to the Territory of Deseret between 1847 and May 10, 1869 or who were born here. We also appreciate having books donated to us that tell the history of specific towns, cities, counties and areas within Deseret.

We also accept books with topics that pertain to pioneer times and culture. Phyllis Griffiths is the ISDUP board member in charge of the library.

PROMOTION/PUBLICITY COALITION WELCOMES NEW MEMBERS

MIDWIFE PAULINA ELIZA PHELPS LYMAN

Associate Judith Ann Roda from Parowan, Utah, graciously shares the story of Paulina as recorded by her great greatgranddaughter, MaryGae Evans. The DUP Camp in Parowan is named Aunt Paulina Camp #367.

This pioneer was born March 20, 1827 in Lawrence, Illinois. When she was fourteen years old, her family joined the Mormon Church and traveled to Nauvoo. After arriving in Deseret in 1858, Brigham Young soon sent her family to Parowan.

For more than a generation, all the medical aid in that community was at the hands of "Aunt Pliny." She married Apostle Amasa M. Lyman who had come across the plains in 1847. She had received her education in medicine in a course in obstetrics and child care

offered by Dr. Ellis Ship. While raising a big family in Parowan, she cared for the sick and delivered all the babies. The children of the town had never heard about the "stork" because they all believed that "Aunt Pliny" brought them in her black bag!

It was Paulina who vaccinated all the children when an epidemic of smallpox swept the town. She was called the sister of mercy and her inherent love of medicine and her skillful hands saved many lives and helped in the growth of her town.

THREE SISTERS SERVE AS CAMP CAPTAINS

Three sisters are currently serving as Captains of their respective DUP camps. These sisters share a rich pioneer heritage as all of their genealogical lines contain pioneers who crossed the plains and settled in the Salt Lake Valley.

They are also third generation members of DUP. Their grandmother, Ruth Asay Tebbs, was a charter member of Camp Cornelia, where she served as Captain. Their mother, Ruth Tebbs Butterfield, served as Captain of Camp 33. That camp is now called 33/Aztec, where Patricia serves as the current Captain.

LEE'S FERRY IS A GREAT HISTORICAL TOUR

Lee's Ferry is a site on the Colorado River Coconino County, Arizona, just southwest of Page and south of the Utah/Arizona border. It is the only place for hundreds of miles from which the river is accessible.

John D. Lee, for whom the Ferry is named, came to the crossing in 1870. The

area had previously been inhabited by Native Americans for about 11,500 years with the first Europeans coming with the Dominguez-Escalante Expedition in 1776. Lee was a Mormon pioneer who was instructed to establish a permanent ferry service in order for settlers heading south to Arizona to cross the Colorado. He came with two wives and his children who named the site of their homestead Lonely Dell.

After his death, his wife Emma continued to operate the ferry and make improvements on the homestead. In 1879 the LDS Church bought the ferry and transferred its operation to Warren Marshall Johnson and family.

A short walk to the original homestead is well worth your time. In the spring, the orchards are gorgeous and in the winter the spot is ideal for a warm vacation. Summer can be very hot so now is the time to explore Lee's Ferry.

FUND RAISING RECITAL

The Salt Lake Far Southeast Company decided to venture into a new method of fundraising by organizing a recital that would help raise money for the Pioneer Cemetery which is under their care. The music director helped get the project started by asking a violinist friend about donating her time and talents for the recital. Other women in the company soon came forward with names of talented people they thought would do the same. COMBINED DUP MEETING



HAVE YOU TRAVELED ON HIGHWAY 56 IN UTAH?

While visiting Cedar City recently, some DUP daughters decided to be adventurous and drive west on **Highway 56**. They had heard that there were many ghost towns and historic sites in that area and were anxious to explore them.

The first stop was at **Pinto** where eight Mormon missionaries had camped on Pinto Creek in 1856. They observed a lush meadow with good water and knew that it had been a stopping place on the Old Spanish Trail. Soon, families of Mormon pioneers moved to the area to farm. Some lived in Santa Clara, Utah in the winter and in Pinto in the spring and summer. In March 1860, Pinto was organized as a prescient of Washington County. A rock meeting house, that was also

used as a school, was built in 1866. In 1868, Union Iron Company began commercial operations at Little Pinto.

The ghost town of **Iron Town** can now be visited featuring an original charcoal kiln, foundations from former buildings and a current covey of wild turkeys.

Further on are the communities of Newcastle and Enterprise. Hebron was the original settlement in this area but after a severe earthquake in 1903, most of the residents moved 10 miles to Enterprise. The first settler was Jacob Micah Truman and the town was soon surveyed for individual homesteads. Charles and John Pulsipher had brought their families to Enterprise in 1882.

The Pilot Peak Camp members of DUP constructed Marker 210 in 1955 to commemorate the settling of Enterprise and its history. It is located by their DUP Museum. The Museum is open by appointment by calling Vickie at 435-878-2566.

Not to be missed is the short drive to Pine Valley. It is located just 45 minutes north of St. George at the headwaters of the Santa Clara River. It was settled in 1859 and was the location for Jacob Hamblin's homestead and summer retreat. The Mormon Chapel was designed by shipbuilder, Ebenezer Bryce in 1868 and used the design of an upside down boat. It is the oldest Mormon Chapel in continuous use. Wood from this area was used for the Tabernacle organ in Salt Lake City.

Continuing south, you will come to the site of the Mountain Meadow Massacre. Two beautiful monuments have been built here; one by the Arkansas families and one by the Mormon Church. This is sacred ground and its history has been well documented.

By now you should be hungry and the little town of **Veyo** is the perfect place to stop for lunch and a piece of homemade pie. The pie shop has been here for many years and specializes in chicken and turkey pot pie as well as every kind of delicious dessert pie. You will also see the Veyo volcano in the background.

You will drive through the Schivwits Indian Reservation on your way back to St. George and can visit their historic cemetery close by the highway.

This tour can usually be done year-round. Their trip was in January and there was no snow and lots of sunshine. If you are tired of the cold where you live, consider this historic tour for a weekend or a week's vacation.




BETTY WELLARD SHARES GREAT PROJECT

MIDWIFE CHRISTINA KINGHORN ARCHIBALD'S AMAZING WORK

Christina was born in Edinburgh, Scotland on June 2, 1811. Her first nursing experience was with the doctor at the bedside of her stepmother. He handed the baby to her and told her to bathe and care for it. From then on, nursing came easily for her.

She and her husband, Robert Archibald, joined the Mormon Church in 1844 and traveled to America, eventually living in Provo, Utah, arriving in 1861.

Christina had nursed occasionally but, after her marriage, she resumed it full-time. She said that she would help white, black or copper colored women as all their babies looked the

same to her. Many Indian women sought her aid. Her records show that to more than one home she delivered over ten babies and never received a cent of pay.

After a delivery, she would stay ten to twelve days to nurse the mother and baby. She would charge \$4.00 if they could afford it or nothing if they could not. Her cheery personality brought comfort and hope to the sick room and she continued her noble work until she was 89 years old. Christina died January 13, 1902 at the age of 91.

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
Are You Missing the Fun at the Pioneer Memorial Museum on Wednesday Nights?
