SPECIAL RECOGNITION FOR LAS VEGAS AREA COMPANIES

The year was 1855 and Brigham Young had sent a group of missionaries to build a Fort in the Valley midway between Salt Lake and Los Angeles. The remains of that fort are with us to this day. The property the fort was built on has passed through many hands and the fort was about to be demolished back in the 1960s, but the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers in Clark County helped save what is today known as the Las Vegas Old Mormon Fort (now a Nevada State Park). On Wednesday, May 20, 2015, Clark Nevada DUP was honored by the City of Las Vegas with a plaque and citation for their service in the Historical Preservation of Las Vegas. Clark County Nevada now has four companies: Clark Centenniel Hills, Clark County North, Clark Desert Springs and Clark Legacy Meadows with 21 active Camps. Members from Desert Springs and Legacy Meadows Companies were in attendance when the Mayor and City Council members presented an award to Jan Zobrist, Regional Representative of Nevada, for DUP saving the Old Mormon Fort, and for their years of active service in the area. They were also acknowledged for their Outreach program both at the Old Mormon Fort and in local schools.

HENEFER CAMP DREAM COMES TRUE

On the morning of Saturday, June 20, 2015, the realization of a dream happened at the open house and dedication ceremony for the Henefer Camp Museum and Henefer Town Heritage Park. Although the camp had a cabin which was built in 1938 to house their artifacts, it became apparent there were a number of problems with the cabin, causing concern for the preservation of the many relics in the building. The Summit Company, **Henefer Camp** decided to do something.

Land became available where the "Red Brick Church" once stood. Also formerly located on the same site was a fort that protected early settlers from wild animals and Native American Indians. Other LDS facilities had also been on the site. It was deemed extremely important to preserve the site. Henefer is on the original pioneer trail and was a known trail for the Donner Reed Party and the Pony Express.

The camp approached the Henefer Town Council and board, and working together, purchased the land from the LDS Church and signed a 99 year lease with the town. Funding came through hard work and assistance from the State of Utah and museum and historical project grants. After completion, the youth of the area hand carried the artifacts and relics into the new museum.


About 250 guests attended the dedication program including city leadership, key people responsible for building the museum, International DUP President, Maurine Smith, and State House District 53 Representative, Mel Brown. He explained his part in helping obtain funding for the project began when two DUP members invited him to the cabin, explained the problems, and asked for assistance. Brother Ken Fisher praised the many hands that made this project a reality.

As this wonderful group of youth sang "Carry On," one could imagine an earlier scene of pioneers gathering at the banks of the Weber River in Henefer. It would be here that they would make their final preparations and with "fresh courage" enter the Salt Lake valley.

Amber Dunn, a Plain City Camp Member, sang a special song "One Who Understands." Maurine Smith, ISDUP President, made a few remarks. Then President Phil Meyer, Plain City Stake President, said a blessing on the restored Cabin.

Following the program, the Cabin was opened for visitors to tour the inside of the cabin. The Daughters had also marked the grave of John Carver and two of his wives at the cemetery two blocks away, and attendees were invited to stop there also.

Special guests were Maurine Smith, ISDUP President; Kay Ann Saxton, Satellite Museum Director; Joyce Larrson, Weber North West Company President; and Rhea Gregory, Plain City Camp DUP Captain.

MISS MARY'S MUSEUM

The city of Salina, Utah purchased an old building in the late 1990s, originally known as The Crosby Memorial Chapel, and following a complete restoration in 2000-2004, it became a community museum. It was given the name of **Miss**

Mary's Museum after its last teacher, Miss Mary McCallum, who was a beloved Presbyterian teacher in the community.

Miss Mary's Museum is now a combined community and DUP satellite museum. Displays focus on the North Sevier area, from the history of early settlers to the evolution of the industries that have provided a livelihood for residents.

HIGHLAND DUP CAMP CABIN RIBBON CUTTING

On Saturday, June 6, 2015, The **Highland Camp**, of the Utah North Company, celebrated the repairs that had been made on their 130 year old pioneer cabin with a ribbon cutting ceremony. This cabin, donated to the Highland DUP Camp by Louise Stice in 1991, is the last vestige of pioneer life in Highland. The outside of the cabin had fallen into disrepair. In 2014, five scouts completed their Eagle projects by repairing the outside of the cabin, replacing the doors, installing a new roof, and sanding and painting the fence. Over 770 hours of labor were donated. With the cost of the labor figured in and all the money and materials donated, the cost of the repairs were about \$12,000. This project was supported in part by the Utah Arts & Museums, with funding from the State of Utah and the National Endowment for the Arts in the form of a \$1,000 grant. The mayor of Highland, Mark Thompson, cut the ribbon.

NORTH BEND DUP MARKER #225 REDEDICATED


On June 15, 2015, State Street along the Peterson Dance Hall, in Fairview was jammed with attendees for a rare, but important event — rededicating Marker #225. The original marker which honored the Settlement of Fairview in 1859 had decayed and deteriorated. Monument Chairman, Peggy Llewellyn, set the daunting goal of raising enough money to rebuild the marker out of oolite stone (same stone used to build the Manti Temple), and to lay a new foundation. Quilt raffles, bake sales, donations (including \$500 from the Sanpete DUP Company, led by Mae Thompson), and hundreds of hours of other work finally achieved the goal. On June 15 at 2:00 p.m. in the Peterson Dance Hall, a huge crowd came to hear the three outstanding speakers. Blake Madsen represented the "born and raised" descendants of those who settled Fairview; Katherine Brimhall, International DUP Marker Representative, reviewed the over 578 markers throughout the world which commemorate historic pioneer events. Last, the audience was honored to hear from International DUP President, Maurine Smith, who tickled the audience with humorous local stories as well as an uplifting message to learn from our past and go forward with confidence and faith. After the program, the assemblage moved outside to hear President Michael Ricks of the LDS North Stake give the Dedicatory Prayer. Refreshments were then served in the Gazebo.



MUSEUM GRANTS DEADLINE

Utah Arts & Museums offers grants to museums. These state funds help to support museums and allow them to better care for their collections and improve museum operations. Museums that are open less than 20 hours per week can apply for up to \$1,000. Grant applications will be due January 29, 2016. Additionally, Museum Specialist Jennifer Ortiz has been working hard this year to reach out to small and mid-sized museums to provide technical assistance through site visits to "Preservation Assessments." A number of DUPs have already taken the opportunity to evaluate how to better protect and display their collections. Sometimes it can be a simple, inexpensive change that can make a big difference.
