You have to look out the window every morning to see what season it is today. I hope it improves as we go into spring. Oh, maybe I should hope that spring arrives and not jump right into summer.

I had a most interesting phone call in December from a kind gentleman in California I would like to share with you. Twenty-some years ago his mother passed away at which time his father closed the door to mother's room and forbade anyone to go in for any reason. Father recently passed away so the family now had the task and privilege of sorting through all of mother's and father's things. Mother had been a member of

DUP and in one of her boxes he found two very old minute books from the camp she had belonged to many years ago in Farmington, Utah. "Would DUP be interested in receiving these old minute books?" I assured him we would be very pleased to receive them.

When the package arrived some time later, I was surprised and delighted to find the minutes of the beginning of the Aurelia S. Rogers camp, which started in 1917 with Aurelia herself as an officer. Remember, she was the one who started the very first LDS Primary at the Rock Chapel in Farmington, Utah. The second book contained the minutes of Helen Mar Miller Camp, the second group started in Farmington two years later (1919) and the beginning of the Farmington Company. What a wonderful find this is. Beautiful handwriting! And a delight to read of what took place in their meetings and the collection of the dues, 50 cents each. This was way before they had a Lesson Committee or the publishing of our books. They invited the Pioneers themselves to come and tell their stories first hand. I called the captain of the Aurelia S Rogers camp, Evelyn Gibby, to tell her what I had in my office and would the camp like to have them. She was blown away. I, of course, made copies of the beginnings of the camps and members for our archives but the camp should have the originals. This story also gives me an

opportunity to remind you that your minutes are the history of your camp. There is not a time limit to stop saving or writing the minutes (or history) of your camp.

Coming up on February 28 is the State Museum Advocacy Day at the Utah State Capitol. This is a time you can come to the Capitol Building to get a small taste of many of the museums from around the state in one quick afternoon. The object is to remind our legislators how important museums are to our communities and how we need help in funding our efforts. You are invited, too.

In April is a favorite party day, DUP's birthday. We will have an open house with fun things happening: demonstrations, music and refreshments from 11am till 4pm. That same month we sponsor the Days of '47 Royalty Pageant, April 20-22. Invite your young ladies between the ages 19 to 25 to use this opportunity to have an outstanding experience, to share their ancestry and compete for scholarships to further their education. Do you get that feeling of pride, like I do, when you drive through any of our communities and see another of our DUP museums, usually right in the middle of town and available, to share our stories with everyone? DO YOU KNOW THIS YOUNG LADY?

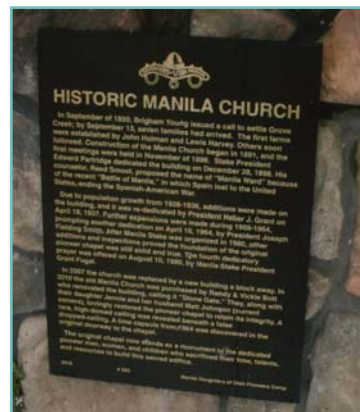

Markers

HISTORIC MANILA CHURCH #582

DUP **Manila Camp** members, descendants of the original settlers, dignitaries and friends traveled through a blizzard to gather for the dedication of the historic Manila Church (the Old White Church) in Pleasant Grove, Utah. The Manila Ward is named in honor of the “Battle of Manila,” which Spain lost to the U.S., ending the Spanish-American War.

In 1850, Brigham Young issued a call to settle Grove Creek (aka Pleasant Grove) and work began on a meetinghouse. The Manila Ward building was replaced in 2007. Randy and Vicky Bott purchased and renovated the original building and called it “Stone Gate.” They, along with Jennie and Matt Johnson, have lovingly restored the pioneer chapel to retain its integrity. A time capsule from 1964 was discovered containing historic documents and photos.

Susan Schumacher, Manila Camp Captain, conducted the November 28, 2016, program. Katherine Brimhall, ISDUP 4th Vice President, commended the Botts and Johnsons on their renovations and the importance of DUP honoring our pioneer heritage. Remarks and the Dedicatory Prayer were offered by Elder D. Todd Christofferson, Quorum of the Twelve Apostles, of the LDS Church. A luncheon followed the event, compliments of Stone Gate.

THAYNE RELIEF SOCIETY BUILDING #581

The dedication of the **Thayne Relief Society Building marker #581** and Star Valley, Wyoming, Lincoln Company's 75th Anniversary celebration culminated on October 22, 2016. The program at the Thayne Stake Center paid tribute to the original Star Valley Relief Society women, and marks a significant historic site for Star Valley. The original women took the matter of having a place to meet into their own hands and raised the necessary funds to build the structure. A copy of the Relief Society's history was included in the time capsule at the dedication of the Star Valley LDS Temple.

A tribute was presented by Linda Holsan, who honored Velma Broadbent, an original Lincoln Company member. Dorene Bateman introduced Katherine Brimhall, ISDUP

4th Vice President over Historic Markers. Katherine paid tribute to those enterprising and determined women of the past and to those of the present—DUP women that continue to honor that same pioneering spirit! Katherine thanked the marker

committee: Grace Marland, Linda Holsa and Nan Hinck. Kay Ann Saxton, ISDUP Satellite Museums Chairman, also attended.

Maurine Smith, ISDUP President, offered brief remarks and the Dedicatory Prayer. The crowd of over 100 then adjourned for an Open House at the Thayne Relief Society Building/DUP Museum for lovely refreshments, a tour and visiting.

SPRING CITY #158

Canal Creek Camp

Daughters, Spring City Corporation officials, families and friends were delighted to culminate the rebuilding, renovations and beautification of **Spring City Marker #158**.

Carla Nelson, Spring City, Utah, DUP Captain, reported that they had plumbed the spring, laid stone, built a new sidewalk, added curbing, railing and a lamp. They topped off the monument with a new capstone and sealed the cement and stone. Two additional plaques further enhance the marker, explaining the significant history of the spring that included early baptisms, the beginning of courtships and escaping the summer heat. A sizeable grant was secured from The Mormon Pioneer Heritage Highway Area, with matching funds from the local DUP and Spring City. The DUP's efforts continue writing a significant chapter in the preservation of history of Spring City, as they care for the monument and their fine DUP Museum. Katherine Brimhall, ISDUP 4th Vice President over Historic Markers, spoke at the dedication, explaining the purpose of DUP markers and commended them for strengthening those connections with the past. Jon L. Blain gave a local history, followed by the Dedicatory Prayer by Mayor Jack Monnett.

The schools were assigned to "towns" named after early Gold Rush settlements: Dry Diggins, Coloma, Tahoe, El Dorado and others. Each town housed six stations where the children learned rope making, tin punching, blacksmithing, handkerchief dolls, gold panning and pioneer games. The children were given a fun, hands-on experience that was tremendously rewarding for them and for those assisting. Roberta Tanner, our Northern California representative, also participated.
